## Caledonia, Ontario Caledonia Presbyterian Church

#### Historical Sketch

The congregation of Caledonia Presbyterian Church was formed in 1846, when the Rev. Andrew Ferrier, a Presbyterian missionary from Scotland arrived in the district and held services of worship in the local school. A church building was constructed in 1849 on Argyle Street. At the same time, however, the congregation was divided between those wishing to be associated with the Established Church of Scotland, and those joining with the United Presbyterian Church. Rev. Ferrier, along with a number of congregants joined the United Presbyterian Church and built a new church building on Edinburgh Square, which later became known as the Sutherland St. Church. From 1846, Dr. Ferrier also ministered to congregations in Allan Settlement, Ancaster, and Oneida. Oneida was removed from the pastoral charge in 1862, and Allan Settlement appears to have been removed by 1887. In 1887, the two congregations in Caledonia (the Argyle St. Church and the Sutherland St. Church) were united, continuing to worship in the Argyle Street church. In 1898, the old church was replaced with a newer building.

## Calgary, Alberta St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church

#### Historical Sketch

The congregation of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church was established in 1906. Originally worshipping out of a building on the corner of 9<sup>th</sup> and 13<sup>th</sup> St. East, the congregation moved into a new building at the corner of 8<sup>th</sup> Ave. and 14<sup>th</sup> St. in 1911. In 1961 the congregation moved again, this time to Elbow Drive, where they worshipped at the Haysboro School while a new church was under construction. On October 14<sup>th</sup>, 1962 the new church was dedicated. In 1983, the congregation took the initiative in organizing a new congregation on what was then the southern edge of the city. This work led to the establishment of Trinity Presbyterian Church in January 1988.

## Cambridge, Ontario Central Presbyterian Church

#### Historical Sketch

Central Presbyterian Church in Cambridge, Ontario was formed in 1880 from the union of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Galt (est. 1832), and Union Church, Galt (est. 1857). Union Church has its origins in the development of a United Presbyterian Church in 1857 by The Rev. John King from the United Presbyterian Church of Scotland. It was located at the corner of Blair Road and Metcalfe Street in Galt. In 1861, the name was changed to "The Second Canada Presbyterian Church", Galt, and again to Melville Presbyterian Church in 1866. In 1870, it merged with Bayne Presbyterian Church, which was formed a year earlier by a minority of members from Knox's Galt Presbyterian Church. With this merging, the congregation took the name Union Church. With the formation of Central Presbyterian Church from the merging of Union Church and St. Andrew's Church, construction began on a new building, which was officially opened on March 5<sup>th</sup>, 1882.

## Cambridge, Ontario Knox's Galt Presbyterian Church

#### Historical Sketch

Knox's Galt Presbyterian Church, Cambridge had its origins in 1883 with the formation of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, in connection with the Church of Scotland. In 1844, the majority withdrew from St. Andrew's to join the Presbyterian Church of Canada. The minority entered a lawsuit to retain the church building and so, the majority took the name Knox's and constructed their own church building. The first minister inducted at Knox's Galt Presbyterian Church (Cambridge, ON) was the Rev. John Bayne. The congregation voted against Church Union in 1925 and remained with The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

## Cambridge, Ontario St. Andrew's Galt Presbyterian Church

#### Historical Sketch

St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Galt began as a mission school started by the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor of Central Presbyterian Church, Galt. The school moved in 1903 to a new building named St. Andrew's Hall, at the corner of Spragues Road and Cedar Street. In 1916 the people of St. Andrew's Hall were given authority to organize as a Mission Station with financial support from Knox's, Central and First Presbyterian churches. The Rev. J. D. Parks, came to the mission as a student pastor and in November 1917, The Rev, J. J. Lowe was called as Minister, a post he held for twenty-three years. In 1918 St. Andrew's Mission became St. Andrew's Church. In 1957 a new church was built at the corner of Victoria Avenue and Osborne Street, Galt.

It is important, however, to note that there have been two St. Andrew's Presbyterian Churches in Galt. The other St. Andrew's, Galt began in 1833 when it was connected with the Church of Scotland. In 1844, the majority of the congregation withdrew from St. Andrew's to join the Presbyterian Church of Canada, known as the "Free Church" and continuing under the name Knox Presbyterian Church. The minority entered a lawsuit to retain the church building and continued as St. Andrew's until 1880 when they joined with another congregation to form Central Presbyterian Church, Cambridge.

#### Note

The reason for the preponderance of Marriagess is that one of the ministers of St. Andrew's, Galt, the Rev. J. J. Lowe, continued to officiate at marriages after his retirement in 1942 and maintained Marriagess which were passed to the congregation on his death. These marriages, and many marriages before his retirement took place at his home in Hespeler, and the connection with St. Andrew's, Galt is not always evident in the registers.

## Cambridge, Ontario St. Andrew's Hespeler Presbyterian Church

#### Historical Sketch

The congregation of St. Andrew's Hespeler Presbyterian Church has it's origins in the united Congregation of New Hope (Hespeler) and Doon, which called it's first minister, Rev. Thomas Hodgskin in 1856. From 1855 to 1863, the congregation in New Hope met for worship in the Royal Templar's Hall on Cooper Street. In 1863, they built a church, which was used until 1908, when the present church on Queen St. was built. In 1892, the Hespeler and Doon congregations were separated. In 1925, the congregation in Hespeler voted to remain with The Presbyterian Church in Canada. In 1988 a Christian Education building was added to the church.

## Cannington, Ontario Knox Presbyterian Church

#### Historical Sketch

The congregation of Knox Presbyterian Church in Cannington, Ontario, dates from 1865, although it existed as a mission station for a few years prior to that time. A church building was constructed on King St. in Cannington in 1865 and the first minister called to the charge was The Rev. Hugh Campbell. By 1876 it was decided that a larger church should be constructed and 1877 property was purchased on Lots 9 and 10 on the North side of Cameron Street. The new building was opened and dedicated on October 5, 1879. The congregation voted against Church Union in 1925 and continued as a congregation within The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

## Carberry, Manitoba **Knox-Zion Presbyterian Church**

#### Historical Sketch

The congregation of Knox-Zion Presbyterian Church in Carberry, Manitoba, was formed in 1985 from the amalgamation of Knox Presbyterian Church, Carberry and Zion Presbyterian Church, Wellwood. Knox Presbyterian Church dates from 1881 when The Rev. Donald McConnell was inducted into the charge. For several years prior to this, however, settlers in the area met for worship in the homes of a few of the parishioners. A new church building for Knox was constructed in 1910. Zion Presbyterian Church in Wellwood dates from approximately the same time, also being served by Rev. McConnel, until 1884 when it called The Rev. T.C. Court. Rev. Court ministered to the Wellwood congregation and surrounding areas of Petrel, Oberon and Brookdale. A church building was constructed in 1897 and was moved to a new location in 1904. In 1925, both Knox, Carberry and Zion, Wellwood voted to remain with The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

## Carluke, Ontario St. Paul's Presbyterian Church

#### Historical Sketch

St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, Carluke was established in 1845, meeting in the log school house on the sixth concession (Allan Tract) of Ancaster Township (Carluke). The congregation was part of the Presbytery of West Flamboro and was connected to the Presbyterian Church of Canada. In 1846, The Rev. Andrew Ferrier, D.D. was called jointly, by St. Paul's, Carluke and the Presbyterian congregation in Caledonia.

In 1850 a split in Scotland between the established church and the free church, divided the congregation. The congregation had erected a new church building in 1850, and one group, led by Rev. Dr. Ferrier, continued to worship there. This group were known as the United Presbyterian Congregation of Ancaster East, changing their name to Erskine Presbyterian Church in 1866.

A dissenting group returned to worship in the school house, until in 1855, a new church building was constructed. This congregation was known as Knox Presbyterian Church and they were led by The Rev. James Black. In 1886 the two congregations were re-united. The church buildings of Erskine and Knox were dismantled in 1898 and a new church was built, known as St. Paul's Presbyterian Church. This building was destroyed by fire in 1924 and was rebuilt that year on the same site.

The status of the congregations has varied through the years. The Erskine congregation had mission field status in 1870. In 1927, St. Paul's, Carluke was linked with Knox Presbyterian Church, Binbrook as two-point charge, reverting to mission field status in 1941. In 2001, St. Paul's, Carluke and Knox, Binbrook form a two-point charge.

## Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island The Kirk of St. James

#### Historical Sketch

The congregation of the Kirk of St. James in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, was founded in 1825. Presbyterian settlers in the area, however, had been ministered to as early as 1791 by The Rev. James McGregor of Pictou, Nova Scotia. Property was purchased in 1825 and construction on a church building was begun in 1826. It wasn't until 1831, however, that the new church was dedicated for worship. At that time, the Rev. James Mackintosh was inducted as the first minister. In 1878 a new building was constructed and the old church served as a Sunday School. In 1895, the old church was dismantled and a Kirk Hall was erected in its place. The congregation voted to remain within The Presbyterian Church in Canada at the time of Church Union in 1925.

## Chatham, Ontario St. James Presbyterian Church

In 1962, St. James, Chatham and the mission of New St. Andrew's were linked as a two-point charge and arrangement which continued until 1991. A manse was maintained at 50 Finch Street, Chatham during this period.

St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church. Cobourg had its origins in the 1820s and was organized as a congregation of the Church of Scotland by 1833, with the first building erected in 1834. In 1848, after a vacancy of some years the congregation called a minister from the free Church of Scotland, thereby entering the Presbyterian Church of Canada. In 1860, dissenting members who wished to remain in connection with the Church of Scotland obtained legal title to the church property so the majority of the congregation re-located. In 1925 the congregation voted to remain in The Presbyterian Church in Canada but the minister and several elders entered the United Church of Canada. In 1937 the church building was destroyed by fire and a new building erected.

This was replaced with a new building in 1879, located on the corner of Maple and Third Streets. It voted to remain Presbyterian at the time of Church Union in 1925. In 1970, Knox Presbyterian Church in Gibraltor closed and the congregation was merged with First Presbyterian Church, Collingwood. The congregation continued under the name First Presbyterian Church, Collingwood.

# Corunna, Ontario St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church

#### Historical Sketch

St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Corunna, Ontario traces its origins to 1855 when a church building was constructed on the north side of Hill Street. The congregation was served by the Rev. John Gould from 1856-1860, and by student ministers until 1872, when the Rev. James McKutcheon was inducted into the charge. Rev. McKutcheon also ministered to the congregations in Mooretown and Moore until his death in 1889. At the time of Church Union in 1925 the congregation of St. Andrew's in Corunna voted to remain within The Presbyterian Church in Canada. In 1960, the congregation constructed a new church building with the old one being sold to the Corunna United Church. The dedication service for the new building was held on Feb. 26, 1961.

### Crieff, Ontario Knox Presbyterian Church

#### Historical Sketch

Knox Presbyterian Church in Creiff, Ontario dates from the early 1800s. In 1839, the Presbytery of Hamilton organized the Presbyterians in East and West Puslinch into a single congregation, with two different church buildings. The forerunner of Knox Church in Crieff was the "West Puslinch" Church, built in 1840 on Lot 15 just north of the 1st concession. This church continued to be used until 1854 when a new church was built where the present church now is at Crieff. The east church developed into the congregation of Duff's Presbyterian Church, Puslinch. In 1853, when the Rev. Meldrum resigned, the East and West churches were separated and established as distinct congregations with a minister and session in each. At this time the West congregation decided to build a new church, and to change the location from Lot 15 to Lot 26 in the village of Fraserville. The name appears to have been changed to Crieff around 1862. In 1882, the congregation decided to rebuild the church and the old frame church of 1854 was replaced with a brick building. The designation of Knox Presbyterian Church, Crieff also dates from this time. In 1890, it was decided that Knox Church, Crieff and Duff's Church, Puslinch should be linked as a two-point pastoral charge with one minister. On May 31, 2001, the two churches were dis-joined, and Knox Presbyterian Church in Crieff again became a single-point charge with its own minister.

Knox Presbyterian Church (West Lorne, Ont.) amalgamated with Argyle on September 30, 2000.
