diring the days that followed, april que luring the week ending april 7th 9 received instructions from the serior Chaplain of the 1st Choisins to report for duty, on the morning of april at the 2 nd Field ambulance, Ecoivers on the afternoon of april 5th in time to assist in handling a number casualties that were brought to the delsing station as the result of a severe bombardment which the village suffered during the after noon, The total casualties were about 20 six of whom were hil I he morning of april 9 day long to be remembered by the Comadians, was cloudy or

threatened rain, Promptly at 5,30 but the great attack was with Viny Ridge the objective. By 10 octooks the wounded began to arrive from the advanced dressing stations, from one or two walking cases the numbers slowly increased until towards evening they come through in almost a constant stream. The real rush however did not take block until Tuesday night owing to the difficulty experienced in bringing the wounded to the advanced stations, ambulance after ambulance arrived until every brailable shace in the dressing station was occupied by stretchers. By four oclock on wechnesday morning the rush was over and most of us were able to retire for a few down of well earned rest. By Thursday morning the wounded

monday, Tuesday and Wednesday had all been evacuated to the C.C.a.C. and the dressing room of the Field ambulance become something time normal again is no easy matter to record first what I did during those bessy days. herhaps it will be sufficient to day that I tried to make myself as useful and helpfull as possible that of course, includes a wide range activities from handing out coff and writing host courts to relatives to butting on bandages and assisting with operations Ou Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday I assisted also with the Durials at the Ecowers Cemetery where there was considerable conjustion and confusion due to a lack of proper systems On Thursday I visited the scene of mondays buttle, a right I shall
